Operations Update:

The Village is in a position to acquire an existing oversized garage and yard nearby, where I plan to re-locate both the Public Works and Water departments, after which the Alsip police department equipment will be re-located to the vacated garage to best protect our assets and allow for indoor servicing, etc. We also recently purchased our 1st police department pickup truck. (competitive pricing is \$10,000 less than typical purchases)

Business Update:

- Coca-Cola 5321 W 122nd Street is expanding their operations by building Alsip's largest structure at 700,000sqft, 90' tall, where robotics will assist inventory control and allow more product lines to be introduced at this facility. They are relocating over 200 additional employees at this location and incentivizing them to purchase homes in the area, to become Great Lakes Coca-Cola's headquarters in Alsip.
- Have you visited Deuces Sports Bar & Grill yet? Located at 11525 S Pulaski, they purchased the adjacent storefront and expanded to accommodate more patrons, including an oversized salt water fish tank, adding to the enjoyment of a great breakfast, lunch or dinner with friends.
- Laura's Craft Wine and Beer café has opened at 4045-47 W 115th Street.
- El Coyote 11532 S Pulaski is promoting outdoor dining and installed a very nice covered patio area on Pulaski, plus a new LED sign



- **EI Don** has opened at the former Demon Dogs location with many choices of Mexican cuisine.
- Taco Burrito King purchased the Village owned property at 11706-30 S Pulaski and they plan to build a 6,000sqft strip center with 1/2 of it being a restaurant and they'll have 2 retail stores there as well. This will afford TBK an opportunity to increase their drive-thru.
- Remodeling has been completed at the Grand Plaza Professional Offices at 11933 S Pulaski and available for new tenants to lease office spaces.
- Red Shoes Billiards at 12009 S Pulaski has installed new equipment and is a great place to meet friends, join a league, or play video gaming til 2am.
- 7-Eleven is now open at 127th & Pulaski, this is their largest store at 4,000sqft and has a great selection of convenience products, plus gasoline and diesel fuel.



Only one vehicle sticker per household shall be eligible for the discounted vehicle license be that senior, disabled or military/veteran.



The Clerks Office is the hub for Village Hall and there are many things that go on behind the scenes to make things easier for residents.

The brain power behind these updates is Erica O'Donnell, Office Supervisor Building/Clerks/ Water Departments and her staff

- Cross training within the office is ongoing. Any of the clerks should be able to help with any request.
- Transfer stamps have been changed to a label instead of running them through a machine. This saves time and one label can be used for any dollar amount.
- She worked with the Finance Department to allow the purchase of transfer stamps with a credit card. This opened up another payment option for residents when they are selling a property.
- Added a second credit card machine at the window. Now each clerk has their own machine eliminating the need to wait for another transaction to be completed.
- Elimination of one vehicle sticker form. All forms mailed will now have the qualifications for discounted stickers at the bottom. This will hopefully lower the instances of residents purchasing full price stickers in error.

A new feature coming soon to the Village in is Click2Gov.



The Finance and IT departments have been working for over a year to bring this feature to our bill paying services. This service offers upto-date, online views of customer water utility accounts, while also providing several convenient payment options.

Brian Massari, IT Manager, and Karen Bonnema, Staff Accountant, have put in many hours and suffered many delays due to COVID to bring this product to the public. Staff and Administrator training will take place in April with functionality being available to the public soon.



FIRE DEPARTMENT

Update from the Fire Department



Thomas Styczynski Fire Chief

Welcome to 2021. Even though we are still dealing with the Covid 19 Pandemic, we are finally starting to see the light of hope!! Many of our firefighters have received the vaccine and now we are seeing mass vaccination sites to help minimize the virus, if not extinct it. I'm sure many of you are happy to put 2020 behind us and move forward. We

at the Alsip Fire Department are ready to move forward again. Last year we put many of our public education programs on hold, was forced to change how we operate to protect our firefighters and the public from Covid, and most importantly how to remain sane through it all. To help cope with everything that has been going on and to keep our mental health in check we brought in the Illinois Fire Service Institute to instruct a class on Resiliency. Each shift sat in on the 4 hour class during the winter months. During this past year, first responders along with the healthcare professionals have been put through the ultimate test of our mental health strength.

As of this writing, the Fire Prevention Bureau has started up annual inspections again. In 2020 we completed the apartment inspections and stopped short of about 100 businesses. Considering the situation our inspectors did an outstanding job. We are now formulating plans to roll out our public education programs once again. This includes are monthly CPR classes, offering CPR, bleeding control and fire extinguisher classes to our businesses and of course hoping to hold our annual open house. Prior to Covid, we planned on starting home inspections (voluntary to homeowners) and will move forward with that program

among others. Our Public Education division has received a grant from the National Fire Protection Agency to initiate Community Risk Reduction strategies. More information will be coming out in the future.

The Alsip Fire Department is planning on purchasing two new pieces of equipment this year. We will be replacing our oldest ambulance. The ambulance was purchased in 2001 and rechassissed in 2011. Due to materials hard to come by because of the effects of covid and the supply chain, the build time for the new ambulance will be about 8 months compared to 4 normally. Secondly, we will be purchasing and placing in service a new mini-squad.

This squad will be used to respond to all ambulance calls, auto-accidents, prairie fires and a few other types of responses. This squad is being purchased to reduce the overall costs of maintenance and fuel of our current fleet. It is also intended to extend the life span of our current fire apparatus. The Alsip Fire department used a similar type vehicle from the late 70s until 1994 and proved invaluable. This mini-squad was originally put in last year's budget but due to the unknown effects of the pandemic and economics it was put on hold along with other capitol projects.

In 2021 the Alsip Fire Department welcomed Firefighter/ Paramedic Miguel Luis to the department. Miguel was hired to fill a vacancy that was created last year and we look forward to having Miguel for a happy and long career with our fire department.

Even though the pandemic has slowed us down some and made us rethink out of the box to operate, the fire department has been busy maintaining our level of training. In January we had the fire department hosted a hazardous Materials Incident Command class. We had 1 lieutenant and 2 acting attend the class with 25 other students from fire departments across the state. In March FF/PM Laura Memmesheimer will be attending a week course (120 hours) to become a fire investigator. In March we will also be hosting a Rope Rescue class from the Illinois Fire Service Institute. There will be 6 Alsip Firefighters in the class of 37 students attending. In March our firefighters also honed their skills in bus extrication (rescue). Due to the amount of homes in Alsip that have solar panels, we will be providing specialized training for that new hazard in the near future. There are other classes planned besides our scheduled training to keep all our fighters up to date with the latest techniques and sharp with their skills.

Update from our local CERT Team

Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) Basic CERT Training – Class #4

The Village of Alsip will be hosting a Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) 20-Hour Basic Course starting on Wednesday, September I,

2021. The Course is FREE and will be held on seven Wednesday evenings from 6:30 pm to 8:30 pm at the Alsip Village Hall. The class covering fire safety will be held on one Wednesday evening at Reliable Fire & Security in Alsip. The Final Exercise and Graduation will be held on Saturday, October 23, 2021, at the village hall or a different location from approximately 8:00 am to 1:00 pm.

The CERT Program educates people about disaster preparedness for hazards that may impact their area and trains them in basic disaster response skills, such as fire safety and extinguishment, light search and rescue, team organization, and disaster medical operations including first aid, bandaging, splinting and bleeding control. Using the training learned in



the classroom and during exercises, CERT members can assist others in their neighborhood or workplace following an event when professional responders are

not immediately available to help. CERT members also are encouraged to support the community by providing assistance with non-emergency events and emergency preparedness related projects. No experience is needed, we will provide you with the training needed to become a volunteer Alsip CERT member. The CERT program is applicable to all ages, however, the minimum age to participate for this particular course is 18 years of age.

The sound of grinding metal, a flashing blue welding arc, and a little rock & roll music well into the evening were not uncommon in the workshop at the Kirk household. From

a young age, Ed Kirk could be found helping his father in their backyard machine & fabrication shop. Too young to run the big machines & power tools, Ed's primary tasks included sweeping up metal shavings, fetching tools, and holding the flashlight for his dad (usually in the wrong spot). Little did he know that these simple



tasks were laying the foundation for what would become his passion and career later in life. As time passed in that shop Ed cultivated an expertise in metal fabrication and machining.

While attending Marist High School, Ed discovered a love for drafting and using various CAD systems. At age 18 he got his first job at Billet Specialties where he spent time furthering his CAD and engineering skills while designing high end CNC



machined aftermarket automotive accessories.

Four years later it was time for a change. At 21 years of age it was time to combine all of the skillsets that had been

acquired up to this point and go on a journey.

Ed opened his own shop, Kirco Precision Tool, in the summer of 2010. His interest in technology and precision metal

work lead to the purchase of an Omax CNC Waterjet Machining Center. Waterjet Technology has revolutionized 2 dimensional cutting by using an extremely high pressure jet of water mixed with an abrasive to cut metal, plastic, wood, stone, rubber, foam, and virtually any other material with exceptional accuracy.

In 2012 Ed's girlfriend Cara began working at Kirco full time and has since learned to operate many of the machines and programs to keep the business running smoothly. Together they are able to complete orders for a variety of different industries and applications.

Currently Kirco Precision Tool has expanded beyond their primary service of CNC waterjet cutting to include Metal Shearing, Bending, Welding, and basic machining services. Kirco has its sights set on the future of manufacturing in America and encourages younger generations of entrepreneurs to chase their dreams and follow their heart.

National Night Out is a community-building campaign held annually that promotes police-community partnerships and neighborhood camaraderie to make our neighborhoods safer, better places to live.

National Night Out is designed to heighten crime prevention and drug awareness. One goal is to send a message to criminals letting them know that the residents are organized and working with the police to protect their neighborhoods. It is a great opportunity to meet your neighbors, police officers and village officials.

Coyotes in Our Neighborhoods

Village of Alsip have received several calls concerning the activity of coyotes in the area and after contacting the Illinois Department of Natural Resources, they informed us of the following information. Education is the number one factor in dealing with the coyotes and they stressed that in the event of coyotes being aggressive and are causing a threat to the community to call them as soon as possible.

Coyotes are found throughout Illinois—in rural, suburban and urban areas. So if you see a coyote resting in or crossing a backyard, golf course, park or field—that is normal coyote behavior. It is also common to see coyotes out during the day. As long as they are given their space, coyotes do not typically pose a threat to people or pets.

Here are some steps to prevent human-coyote conflicts

Do not run if a coyote approaches you. Yell, stand up straight, and wave your arms (the goal is to make yourself appear larger), or throw something at the coyote to make it move away (the goal is to scare it away, not to injure it).

Teach your kids what to do if they see a coyote. Have them throw their arms up in the air and yell "like a monster" to scare the coyote away.

Do not leave small pets unattended when they are outside, especially at night. Consider the use of fencing or kennel runs to protect small pets. **Do not feed coyotes.** Property owners should limit the availability of unintentional food sources, such as bird food, pet food, ripe fruit, or trash.

Comply with local ordinances that require oversight/restraint of pets. Coyotes that are protecting their den or young will vigorously defend the area. Simply walking your dog in another area keeps everyone safe.

Alert residents of the neighborhood and the local municipality (e.g., police, public safety officer) if, and as soon as, a problem develops with a coyote.
