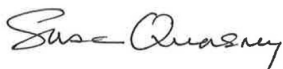

Annual Facility Inspection Report – Attachment 1

Item A: Description of Changes to BMPs

No changes to the Village's BMPs were made during the 2025-2026 reporting period. Changes are anticipated to the BMPs in the next reporting year in accordance with new requirements of the 2025 MS4 Permit.

Item B: Status of compliance with permit conditions and assessment of minimum control measures

The Village believes that the BMPs completed within the reporting period are appropriate for the permit conditions. The status of each BMP is as follows:

Public Education and Outreach

A1: Public Education

The Village distributes stormwater-related pamphlets at the Community Expo and Village Clean-up Day. Stormwater reminders are posted quarterly on the Village Facebook page and links are provided on the Village website. Attached are several website and Facebook posts from this reporting cycle.

A.6: Other Public Education

The Village posts the last five MS4 annual reports and the NOI on the Village website for the public.

Public Participation and Involvement

B4: Public Hearing

The Village provided time during a Village Board meeting for public education and comment on an annual basis. A meeting agenda is published on the Village website prior to the meeting as public notification. A description of the NPDES program and a summary of activities performed by the Village within each MCM was presented at a Committee of the Whole meeting on March 30, 2026. Documents are attached.

B6: Program Involvement

The Village promotes and sponsors an Alsip clean-up day and two Village Garage Sale weekends each year. The Clean-up occurred on May 10th, 2025, and the Village garage sales occurred on May 9-11 and September 12-14. They also participated in the Chicago River Day, sponsored by Friends of the Chicago River, and the MWRD rain barrel program, and encourages various waste and organic material disposal and recycling through the bi-yearly newsletter, Facebook, and website.

Illicit Discharge Detection and Elimination

C1: Storm Sewer Map Preparation

The Village updates the Storm Sewer Atlas on an as needed/project-by-project basis.

C2/C3: Regulatory Control Program

The Village continues to prohibit illicit discharges into public sewer systems. The website includes a variety of ways to report a concern. All suspected illicit discharges are investigated and MWRD is contacted when an illicit discharge is found. No reports of illicit discharges were received during this reporting period.

C7: Visual Dry Weather Screening

Annual dry weather screenings of priority outfall are performed, and other outfalls are inspected periodically. No physical indicators of illicit discharges were found during this reporting year.

Construction Site Runoff Control

1. D1/D2/D4/D5/D6: Regulatory Control Program

The Village continues to review and update its Stormwater Ordinance. Erosion and Sediment Control Plans, SWPPPs, and application for ILR 10 permits when more than 1 acre of disturbance is occurring with new development are enforced through building permits and development review process. Site inspections of SESC measures for active permits are performed ongoing.

Post-Construction Runoff Control

2. E2 / E5: Post-Construction Runoff Control

The Village continues to review and update its Stormwater Ordinance with regards to post-construction measures. Construction plans are reviewed for compliance with Village and MWRD ordinances. Site inspections are performed through construction, and a final inspection of post-construction measures is required.

Pollution Prevention and Good Housekeeping

3. F1: Employee Training Program

The Village regularly trains personnel regarding fleet and building maintenance, operation of storage yards, snow removal, etc. There was in-house training for salt storage and chemical storage that occurred on 11/10/25.

4. F2: Inspection and Maintenance Program

The Public Works Department performs regular maintenance of stormwater structures. Street sweeping occurs monthly between April and November. 623 tons of debris was picked up during the reporting year.

5. **F4: Municipal Operations Stormwater Control**

The Village reviews municipal operations for waste disposal and revises BMPs as needed. It implements proper disposal BMPs from waste due to municipal operations, including debris from catch basin cleaning and street sweeping activities. The Village continues to offer curb-side refuse, recycling, and branch pick up services to property owners.

6. **F6: Other Municipal Operations Controls**

The Village participates in the Chicago Area Waterway System (CAWS) chloride workshops to minimize the application of salt while maintaining a road standard per Village policies.

Item C: Results of information collected and analyzed, monitoring data (if any).

No illicit discharges or incidents of non-compliance were identified. No water samples for analysis were taken during this reporting period.

Item D: Summary of stormwater activities you plan to undertake during the next reporting cycle (and implementation schedule).

No changes to the BMPs listed in the NOI are anticipated.

The Village of Midlothian works with the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago to enforce the Cook County Watershed Management Ordinance.

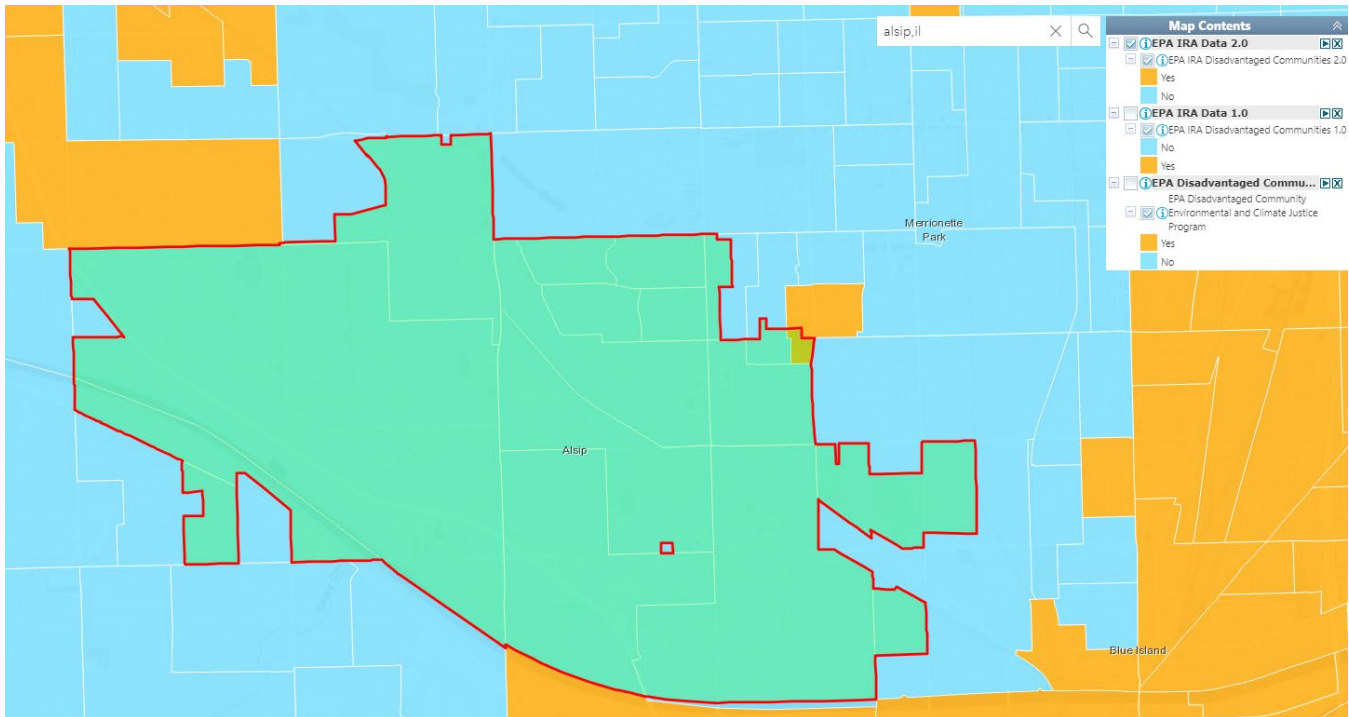

10 EASY THINGS YOU CAN DO TO STOP POLLUTION OF OUR CREEKS AND RIVERS

- 

1. Recycle your used motor oil. Autozone, Valvoline Instant Oil Change, and other service stations in your community accept used oil. Some will also accept your used antifreeze. **Never dump oil or antifreeze down the storm drain which flows into the creeks or rivers.**
- 

2. Reduce auto emission through regular auto maintenance, ride sharing, and use of public transportation. Fix oil, radiator and transmission leaks in your car. **Don't let your car leave ugly oil slicks behind.**
- 

3. Use a garbage can for your trash. Recycle reusable materials. **Don't put trash and litter in the street; it will be washed to the river.**
- 

4. Sweep the dirt from your walk or driveway back into the yard with your broom. Pick up pet waste and dispose of it in the toilet or trash. **Hosing dirt and pet waste away sends it into the drainage system and directly to the creeks & rivers.**
- 

5. Dispose of any hazardous home chemicals at approved household hazardous waste collection sites. **Use the least toxic products available in your home and garden.**
- 

6. Choose water-based paints such as latex. Wash brushes in your sink with water. If using paint thinner, reuse and recycle it. Solidified paint can be disposed of in regular household waste. **Don't pour any paint or toxic material down the storm drain.**
- 

7. Use pesticides and other lawn chemicals sparingly. Never double the dose! **Follow the directions and do not apply if rain is forecasted.**
- 

8. Go to a car wash or wash your car in the grass. **Don't wash that grimy road dirt and chemical cleaners down the drive and into the storm drain.**
- 

9. Pick up and properly dispose of leaves and grass clippings. Start a compost pile with yard waste. **Never use streams or gutters to dispose of yard waste.**
- 

10. Maintain your septic system. Have it pumped out every 3 years to remove sludge and scum. Do not use tank additives, and practice water conservation to prevent overworking your system. **Repair or replace malfunctioning septic systems.**

MARCH 30, 2026**

Mayor Ryan called the meeting to order at 7:30 p.m. Clerk Harding called the roll with the following in attendance: Trustees McLawhorn, Murphy, Perretta, Cahill, Love, and Mayor Ryan. Trustee Dalzell was absent.

BID OPENING – 2025-2026 FORD TRANSIT 350 AWD WORK VAN. 1) Vogler Motor Company; 1170 E. Main St., Carbondale, IL 62901; \$56,093.67. 2) Lynch Truck Center; 2530 Beck Dr., Waterford, WI 53185; \$56,933.50.

Mayor stated that a local business donated a Ford F250 truck to the Fire Department so they have returned a truck they had to us to either sell or repurpose in another department.

MAYOR'S REPORT: Mayor Ryan presented: 1) Request to sell Village-owned property at 12013 S Lavergne. This is half of a duplex that needs a lot of work done to it. We will discuss pricing in closed session.

CLERK'S REPORT: Clerk Harding presented: 1) Presentation of the March 16, 2026 Board Meeting Minutes. 2) Reading into record; Resolution 2026-03-R-1, a resolution pertaining to the municipal construction, operation and maintenance of municipal infrastructure located within the State right-of-way located in the Village of Alsip. 3) Reading into record; Resolution 2026-03-R-2, a resolution authorizing execution of the application for the County of Cook, Illinois' 2026 Community Development Block Grant ("CDBG") Program Year which requests \$400,000 in funding for the roadway improvement of the 119th Street Alley between Keeler Avenue and Komensky Avenue. 4) Reading into record; Resolution 2026-03-R-3, a resolution to authorize execution of a grant application for the Invest In Cook Grant Program which will request funding for improvements along Homan Avenue from 131st Street north to the railroad tracks.

PUBLIC FORM: Nobody came forward.

FINANCE AND INFORMATIONAL TECHNOLOGY REPORT: Trustee McLawhorn presented: 1) List of payroll and accounts payable.

FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT: Trustee Cahill presented: 1) Trustee commended the Fire Department on their hard work over the weekend battling a brush fire behind Prairie Jr High and another fire at a local business. 2) **REQUEST FOR APPROVAL OF AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 9, FIRE PREVENTION AND PROTECTION, ARTICLE IX, FIRE PREVENTION, OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE FOR THE VILLAGE OF ALSIP, ILLINOIS BE AMENDED TO ADD SECTION 9-52, FOGGER GENERATORS IN ESTABLISHMENTS**

The Alsip Public Works Department is responsible for the maintenance of over 51 miles of storm sewer pipe and 2,071 catch basins, 58 outfalls to waterways and 702 inspection manholes. It is important that each year, Public Works continues our program of scheduled cleaning, maintenance, and inspections of our storm sewer system to help prevent pollution of our waterways. Education to our residents, businesses, and local schools on ways to prevent stormwater pollution remains a high priority in our efforts to keep our waters clean. The Village encourages residents to place rain barrels around their homes to help collect rain runoff. The water collected could then be used for watering lawns, flowers, and help reduce storm water overflow into the sanitary sewer system. The Metropolitan Water Reclamation District (MWRD) offers rain barrels to be purchased at a reasonable price and will deliver to your home. A link for MWRD's rain barrel program can be found on the Village of Alsip website. The Village of Alsip holds a Cleanup Day every year in the month of May. Volunteers help pick up garbage and other items that may cause pollution if it gets into our sewers and waterways. Also, the collection of garbage prevents sewers and drainage ditches from being blocked that could lead to flooding. 2) Request to hire two (2) temporary part-time employees to work at the Boat Launch for the 2026 season. Both will work up to 25 hours per week at \$15.00 an hour and will start Memorial

Day weekend. 3) Arbor Day Foundation awarded public works as a Tree City for the 12th year in a row, congrats to the department! 4) Consensus to take 3 vehicles to the local auction in Crestwood for sale.

Stormwater Information

What is stormwater runoff?



Stormwater runoff occurs when precipitation from rain or snowmelt flows over the ground. Impervious surfaces like driveways, sidewalks, and streets prevent stormwater from naturally soaking into the ground.

Why is stormwater runoff a problem?



Stormwater can pick up debris, chemicals, dirt, and other pollutants and flow into a storm sewer system or directly to a lake, stream, river, wetland, or coastal water. Anything that enters a storm sewer system is discharged untreated into the waterbodies we use for swimming, fishing, and providing drinking water.

The effects of pollution

Polluted stormwater runoff can have many adverse effects on plants, fish, animals, and people.

- Sediment can cloud the water and make it difficult or impossible for aquatic plants to grow. Sediment also can destroy aquatic habitats.
- Excess nutrients can cause algae blooms. When algae die, they sink to the bottom and decompose in a process that removes oxygen from the water. Fish and other aquatic organisms can't exist in water with low dissolved oxygen levels.
- Bacteria and other pathogens can wash into swimming areas and create health hazards, often making beach closures necessary.
- Debris—plastic bags, six-pack rings, bottles, and cigarette butts—washed into waterbodies can choke, suffocate, or disable aquatic life like ducks, fish, turtles, and birds.
- Household hazardous wastes like insecticides, pesticides, paint, solvents, used motor oil, and other auto fluids can poison aquatic life. Land animals and people can become sick or die from eating diseased fish and shellfish or ingesting polluted water.



- Polluted stormwater often affects drinking water sources. This, in turn, can affect human health and increase drinking water treatment costs.

Be the Solution to Stormwater Pollution

Things You Can Do to Prevent Stormwater Runoff Pollution:

Never dump anything down storm drains: This includes oil, antifreeze, cleaning products, and other pollutants. Only rain down the drain.

Properly dispose of trash and animal waste: Litter clogs storm drains and can pollute waterways.

Use fertilizers and pesticides sparingly: Overuse can lead to runoff into storm drains.

Direct downspouts away from storm drains: Redirect runoff to permeable surfaces like lawns or

Wash your car at a commercial car wash: Avoid washing your car in the street or driveway, as soapy water can pollute storm drains.

Sweep up driveways and sidewalks: This prevents sediment and debris from washing into storm drains.

Compost yard waste: This reduces the amount of waste that ends up in landfills and prevents pollutants from entering storm drains.

Fix oil leaks in your vehicles:



Recycle used oil, antifreeze, and other fluids: Don't pour them down storm drains or on the ground.

Yard Waste

Yard Waste services are provided by **Republic Services** and will be collected on **Fridays from April 1st until November 30th**. Landscape waste (grass, leaves, branches, brush and other vegetative waste, excluding dirt, clay or other inorganic material) must not be mixed with garbage. Yard waste needs to be placed in a yard waste bag or an appropriately labeled container not to exceed 33-gallon capacity and must not exceed fifty (50) pounds. Tree and shrub trimmings shall be tied and in bundles not exceeding fifty (50) pounds and forty-one (41") in length. Yard waste may not be placed in plastic bags, drums, or fiber drums.

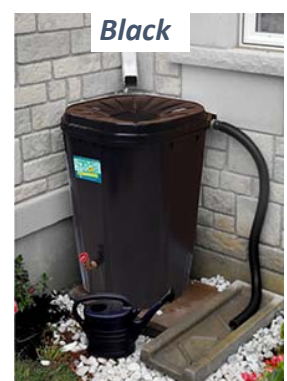

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Maintenance Yard SOPs

Village of Alsip Public Works Maintenance Yard NPDES Standard Operation Procedures & MCM's

Vehicle / Equipment Maintenance

1. Waste vehicle oil should be deposited in the Waste Oil Tank in the rear yard outside door 4.
2. Waste vehicle fluids other than oil should be deposited in the Waste Fluid 55 gallon drum along the wall dividing front garage from back.
3. Individual files should be kept by the Village Mechanic on all work done to each vehicle and piece of equipment.
4. A Monthly Report should be kept by the Village Mechanic on all vehicle maintenance, what was done, what fluids were changed.
5. Document dates of all Oil & Fluid removal from the Public Works Shop and by whom.
6. Vehicles / Equipment being washed should be washed with biodegradable soaps only.
7. Debris washed from Vehicles / Equipment should be placed on non-pervious blacktop area and put in dumpster provided by Homewood Disposal after.
8. Tires removed should be taken to Stony Tire for proper disposal.

General Yard Maintenance / Cleanup

1. The public Works Yard should be kept clean of all debris blowing around.
2. All garbage should be placed in the bins provided by Homewood Disposal.
3. Bulk Rock Salt for winter road preparations should be kept within the Village Salt Dome.
4. Trucks emptying salt after storms should dump salt back into the Salt Dome only.
5. Only chipped branches should be dumped into the Village Chip bin and the bin should be dump prior to overflowing. And all chips should be hauled to Smitty's for proper disposal.
6. All storm sewer basins located within the maintenance yard should be clearly marked Storm.
7. Parts cleaner should be cleaned regularly by Safety-Kleen and notices saved.

BMP's

1. Proper disposal of oils and fluids and parts cleaner.
2. Quarterly Inspection of Public Works Yard & Building and document.
3. Proper Bulk Rock Storage, all salt must stay in dome.
4. Keep storm sewer basins clearly labeled.
5. Keep site map on site.
6. Spill protection equipment on site for both outside and inside spill protection.
7. Training on how to use spill protection material yearly

1. Oils & Fluids
2. Oils and fluids removed from vehicles or equipment during maintenance
3. Bulk Rock Salt
4. Debris / Garbage
5. Used Tires
6. Parts cleaner fluids
7. Fuels
8. Paints
9. Cleaning chemicals
