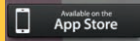

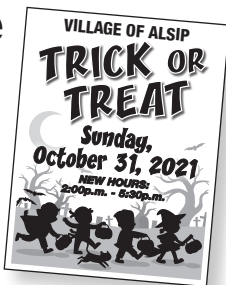

Hello Village of Alsip Residents & Businesses,

The Village of Alsip departments are always working to improve the community through efficiency, technology and strong leadership. We hope the community and businesses are moving forward cautiously, following the first wave of COVID-19. My family doctor and probably yours as well, keeps encouraging the need for everyone to be vaccinated and create the herd immunity we've been told will then return us to a somewhat normal lifestyle and allow us to socialize and participate in organized activities again.

Budget Update:

Myself and the finance department were able to promote a balanced budget for FY22 which the Village Board approved in late July. Many of the capital purchases have been delayed for production of new squad cars, a fire department rescue squad and an ambulance.

Economic Development Update:

Alsip is fortunate to keep attracting new business development and recently approved an agreement for the next three years with NextSite, because over the past 5 years, NextSite has connected and supported over 23 million square feet of commercial development projects resulting in over \$6.1 billion of capital investment. NextSite connects with retailers, restaurants, developers, brokers and tenant reps. Myself and the Village Board hope to increase economic development on Cicero Ave and Nicor Gas utilities has publicly endorsed NextSite.

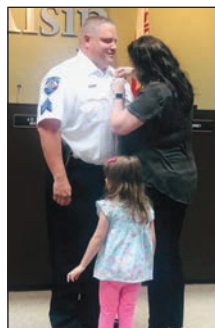

Update from the Fire Department

It's hard to believe 2021 is almost over!! It's been a long and trying year with trying to get out of the covid world, trying to return to normality pre-2020 and just trying to survive through all of this. Kids are back in school, I'm sure most parents are happy about that. We have seen a dramatic increase in traffic again

among other things. There have been quite a few challenges that all of us have faced along the way and keep facing more. But we seem resilient for the most part and making it through those challenges.

The Alsip Fire Department continues to work to provide the best services to the people and businesses that we have sworn to protect. We have seen a dramatic increase in call volume since last year and made some changes along the way to keep us efficient in providing those services. All of our public education programs are up and running again. We are back to offering fire extinguisher classes for the businesses plus CPR for both businesses and residents. We are moving forward and establishing a "Home Inspection" program. It has been a goal for the past several years but was on hold due to covid. At the time of this writing, we are preparing for our in-person Open House which will be held on October 9th. We are hoping to return to our normal crowds from the past. Last year we held a reverse drive-by and was successful, but we miss all the interaction.

The Fire Prevention Bureau is nearing the completion of the annual inspections of the businesses, apartments, and churches. We thank all the businesses for their cooperation during these inspections. These inspections are designed to keep their employees, patrons, and our firefighters safe as well as protecting the building. Our 2 Fire Prevention Officers are extremely busy ensuring that all the requirements are met for testing of fire alarms and sprinkler systems plus keeping up with all of the new construction and remodeling of new and existing buildings.

As I reported in the springtime, we have a new ambulance and a mini squad on order. Our hopes were to have both by the end of the year. However, due to the micro-chip shortage that all the vehicle manufacturers are experiencing, both will be delayed. Hopefully, keeping our fingers crossed we will see them between spring and beginning of summer next year. We are also going out to bid to replace our 2001 fire engine. With the delays in the supply chain, it will take almost 14 months before delivery.

Lastly, the Alsip Fire Department will always strive to provide the best service to the people who we protect. We are always looking at new techniques and equipment to achieve that goal. Stay Safe, keep your family safe and enjoy the upcoming Holidays!!

SCBA Training Program

If any of you have passed by Fire Station 2 since springtime you may have noticed a 45' seaway container. That is being used to construct a training prop. The prop will be a confidence course for our SCBA (breathing apparatus) training program. It will consist of several obstacles to help build and retain confidence in our firefighters while using breathing apparatus. The original plan was to have it constructed in the late spring or early summer, but due to the cost of construction materials (it was cost prohibitive). Since the price of wood has come down somewhat, we are anticipating it being ready by the first week of October. Thanks to the generosity of NuStar Energy, Fox Lumber and the Garden Homes Firefighter's Association, there was a minimum cost to the village for its creation.

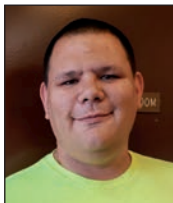
Winter Snow Plow Parking Restrictions

Residents are asked to promptly remove vehicles from village streets at the start of a snow fall. Vehicles are subject to ticketing and towing after a 1" accumulation on marked primary routes and 3" on secondary routes (secondary routes are not marked).

Also, please do not push snow back onto the street as it is unlawful to do so after the street has been plowed. Some snow will overflow onto driveways and sidewalks as part of the plowing process; your understanding of this matter is appreciated.

Snow Removal Suggestions

An unavoidable result of plowing roadways is that some snow will spill off from the plow blade into driveways. The Alsip Public Works understands how frustrating this can be, especially when residents have already cleared the ends of their drives. The department suggests waiting until the plow trucks have made their final pass along the curb line before shoveling. Information pertaining to the plow driver's status in your area can be obtained by contacting the Alsip Public Works at 708-385-6902 x364 during normal business hours (8am - 4:30pm).

If you cannot wait for the plow truck to make its final pass, the following suggestions are offered as a way to reduce the amount of snow overflowing onto the end of your drive:

- Shovel snow at the end of your driveway onto the parkway to the right (when facing the street). This will help to reduce the amount of snow deposited as the plow truck passes by.
- Clear a portion of the roadway directly to the left of your drive (when facing the street). This will also help to reduce the amount of snow deposited as the plow truck passes by.
- Not depositing snow from your driveway into the roadway will also help to reduce the amount of snow that could be plowed onto your drive.

PUBLIC HEALTH DEPARTMENT

Rodent Control and Public Health

People are very concerned about rodent control – and with good reason. Rodents consume and contaminate food with their fur, urine and feces. Rat burrowing causes streets and structures to collapse. Their constant gnawing damages property. Rodents can carry as many as 35 diseases that affect humans and livestock and rat bites threaten thousands of people each year.



Local rodent control programs face many challenges, including a lack of funding and resources. Various aspects of the behavior and biology of rodents, such as the reproductive potential, trap avoidance, and feeding behavior complicate rodent control. In addition, property and business owners may lack understanding of rodent control. The information provided here can help you identify, control, and eliminate them.

You may never see a mouse or rat unless an infestation is severe. Look for signs of rat or mouse infestation:

- GNAWING:** Chewed areas around doors, windows, utility lines and packaged goods, especially where food is kept.
- BURROWS:** Holes and fresh diggings around foundations, under floors, sidewalks, platforms and ditches.
- DROPPINGS:** Fresh droppings are a sure sign that you have a rat problem. Look behind objects, near walls, and in places seldom cleaned or disturbed.
- TRACKS:** Tracks in dusty places. If not visible, dust flour along suspected runways and observe for a few days.
- SMEARS:** When rats travel, they rub against walls to find their way. Look for darkened areas along walls next to pipes, beams and openings where rats are suspected.

PREVENT RODENT INFESTATION

WATER:

- Outside faucets turned off/no leaking pipes or faucet
- Standing water outside & basement
- Water dishes for pets

REMOVE FOOD FROM:

- trash containers
- scraps and wrappers
- stove or on tables between meals
- pet food in or outside overnight; remove pet feces
- Do not dispose of garbage in boxes or paper bags or in cans without lids

REMOVE SHELTER:

- Trash in yards and alleys
- High weeds, tall grass and unkempt bushes
- Firewood against buildings.
- Keep doors closed when not in use
- Fix holes in walls, foundations, floors, and pipes with cement and sheet metal
- Unneeded items stored in basements, cellars, or attics

Alsip Boat Launch

Site renderings for the Boat Launch Green Infrastructure project.

With the outstanding efforts from Emily Okallau from the Morton Arboretum and Alsip Superintendent of Public Works Mike Fraider, the Village of Alsip has been awarded a \$260,000 grant, featuring Green Infrastructure construction that is designated to replace an MWRD parking lot at the Alsip Boat Launch on the Cal Sag Channel.

This project would entail removing half of the parking lot and some turf grass to ultimately install native vegetation and some other vegetative green infrastructure features to improve interception of rainwater and reduce runoff.

This project intends to reduce rainfall interception and non-point source pollution that enters the Little Calumet, to improve green space for those wishing to access the boat launch and river, and to provide an opportunity for education and outreach to the public.

We believe this project has potential to have a positive impact on the site, the greater ecosystem, the Village of Alsip, and can display best management practices in the watershed.

We hope to start removing the parking lot in October.





Community Emergency Response Teams (CERT)

The Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) Program educates people about disaster

preparedness for hazards that may impact their area and trains them in basic disaster response skills, such as fire safety, light search and rescue, team organization, and disaster medical operations. Using the training learned in the classroom and during exercises, CERT members can assist others in their neighborhood or workplace following an event when professional responders are not immediately available to help. CERT members also are encouraged to support emergency response agencies by taking a more active role in emergency preparedness projects in their community.

How does CERT benefit the community?

People who go through CERT training have a better understanding of the potential threats to their home, workplace and community and can take the right steps to lessen the effects of these hazards on themselves, their homes or workplace. If a disaster happens that overwhelms local response capability, CERT members can apply the training learned in the classroom and during exercises to give critical support to their family, loved ones, neighbors or associates in their immediate area until help arrives. When help does arrive, CERTs provide useful information to responders and support their efforts, as directed, at the disaster site. CERT members can also assist

Community Emergency Response Team (C.E.R.T.)

with non-emergency projects that improve the safety of the community. CERTs have been used to distribute and/or install smoke alarms, replace smoke alarm batteries in the home of the elderly, distribute disaster education materials, provide services at special events, such as parades, sporting events, concerts and more.

Why take the CERT training?

Local government prepares for everyday emergencies. However, there can be an emergency or disaster that can overwhelm the community's immediate response capability. While adjacent jurisdictions, State and Federal resources can activate to help, there may be a delay for them getting to those who need them. The primary reason for CERT training is to give people the decision-making, organizational, and practical skills to offer immediate assistance to family members, neighbors, and associates while waiting for help. While people will respond to others in need without the training, the goal of the CERT program is to help people do so effectively and efficiently without placing themselves in unnecessary danger.

Who can take the training?

Natural for the training are neighborhood watch, community organizations, communities of faith, school staff, workplace employees, scouting organizations and other groups that come together regularly for a common purpose. CERT skills are useful in disaster and everyday life events.

CERT Training will teach participants to:

1. Describe the types of hazards most likely to affect their homes and communities.
2. Describe the function of CERT and their roles in immediate response.
3. Take steps to prepare themselves for a disaster.
4. Identify and reduce potential fire hazards in their homes and workplaces.
5. Work as a team to apply basic fire suppression strategies, resources, and safety measures to extinguish a burning liquid.
6. Apply techniques for opening airways, controlling bleeding, and treating shock.
7. Conduct triage under simulated conditions.
8. Perform head-to-toe assessments.
9. Select and set up a treatment area.
10. Employ basic treatments for various wounds.
11. Identify planning and size-up requirements for potential search and rescue situations.
12. Describe the most common techniques for searching a structure.
